This week in Nursery, we were joined by our parents for Stay and Play. We were very excited to show our grown ups the Nursery environment and all the things that we do at school.



We were also visited this week by No Outsiders who spoke to us about treating each other kindly and celebrating differences.






Cherry & Pear

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
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#### Cedar & Rowan






#### Juniper & Sycamore

To prepare we had an experience day using camping equipment to 'camp out' in the school playground. Some of us got rather cold!




In science, we have continued our investigations intoforces and their effects on objects. We have looked at how different amounts of mass can stretch an elastic band.



It is really important that the pupils at Roebuck Academy have participated in The Big Ambition survey and had their say.

I want to ensure that the voices of the children in Hertfordshire are fairly represented in the findings so that I can share their views with the most senior members of the country.

I must reiterate that it is vital that all children have their voice heard through this survey because, as Children's Commissioner for England, I have a statutory duty to protect and promote the views and interests of children. The Big Ambition provides a much-needed opportunity for the children of England to tell political decision makers what is important to them ahead of the General Election. I will be sharing their responses with Government to ensure that children's voices are heard.

Children can complete the survey in assemblies, form times, PSHE or in other lessons this term. The survey can also be done as homework and parents can assist children who cannot complete the survey themselves (children under 5 and children with Special Educational Needs). This is a great opportunity to teach children about politics and why it is important for them to use their voice!
